ARTH/ARTS 290: ART & ARCHITECTURE OF LONDON AND PARIS



This course is a studio art or art history course taught through experiential learning trips, in addition to more traditional methods of teaching.

Students will gain a direct exposure to art and architecture in historic, social and geographic contexts. Since topics and locations will vary from year to year, this course may be repeated for credit if the subject focus and destination are different.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

Upon successful completion of the course, students will have:

- Gained visual, social, and historical knowledge of major monuments of art and architecture
- 2. Developed observational skills and visual knowledge
- 3. Increased oral skill in professional discussion of art and architecture
- 4. Increased research and writing skills

ACADEMIC REQUIREMENTS

- 1. All course text readings must be completed before the trip
- 2. Participation in all activities while abroad
- 3. Research paper on an approved topic relating to the art we will see on the trip
- 4. Two brief oral presentations to be given at the class meetings before the trip and two additional presentations on site in London and Paris
- 5. An illustrated and captioned art history scrapbook/journal of the trip
